To Threads of Love in Stockbridge, GA Hi my name is Teri Renn-Bailey,

I have to work this Friday and will not be able to make it. I really cannot sew, knit or anything. But I was wanting to learn though. My reason why is I think what y'all do is great. I am a registered nurse who happens to work in the neonatal intensive care unit at South Fulton and Piedmont Hospital. At South Fulton we have some ladies who makes up caps and blankets to place on top of isoletes. But we do not have anyone to help make little clothes for our preemies. Patents are very delighted when they see their little ones dressed up in clothes It gives the patents the realization that this is their precious baby and not just a patient. It really brings the bond closer between parent and child because a lot of that is lost when they have a small baby and at the beginning they are not allowed to touch or hold it. Piedmont has the clothes for the babies, but what both hospitals don't have is the lovie dolls that I saw on display with the prayer note. This is why I

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wanted to do the class because I though it would be nice to help y'all make them for Henry Medical Center, but also so I could make them for the babies at the hospital where I work.. Maybe another date will come available where I could come. Please keep me in mind. I again express my gratitude for what y'all do. I cannot begin to tell you the joy and the smiles that your thoughtfulness beings to these parents and the nurses. I am a big believer in the power of prayer and I believe every baby could use a prayer at their bedside. This would be especially good for one mom at Piedmont. (I have her permission to tell her story) She has one child, had one miscarriage, lost one after being born at 23 weeks, and approximately a month ago delivered at 24 weeks. Her baby has had a very tough life since his birth. He has been so sick that at one point mon and dad had to make the decision whether to carry on his life or to let him go on to heaven. As you can imagin,e this is tough choice for any parent to have to make. At one pint they did make the baby a" do not resuscitate". Mom stated she began to lose her faith in God and had decided they needed to let him go. They thought this was the right decision.. Then mom received a phone call telling her to continue to have faith, and not give up because if she did then her baby would not have anyone to believe in him. Well Mom starting praying again, and I can proudly say that her baby is not longer a" do not resuscitate" and has survived life so far despite the nurse and doctors stating that the child would die. (They even said that, if he did live there would not be much there.) This baby is still on the ventilator but he is one"feisty "baby. My point for telling this story is I think Mom felt alone and if Mom had been able to come to her babies beside and see a doll with a prayer attached to it, she might have realized that as medical professional we do think about them in their time of stress, we do pray for them, and they are not alone. Continue to do the good work because it dose not go unnoticed.
