You are an integral part of our team and you do more than make our babies home more comfortable and colorful, you also help them get well faster. Have you ever been somewhere and looked at a baby and just by looking at them you knew they were premature?...usually you see it in the face...Well, our babies at NAMC are very fortunate to have you . All the developmental positioning things like the froggy pillows and bendy bumper covers and little pillow cases for our gel pillows are so helpful to keep our infants in the proper position-like a little womb. Over time these infants develop beautiful little round heads that later when you see them you probably will never know they were premature. And the other positioning aids help keep the baby in the fetal position which will help later for that baby to meet milestones like sitting in a car seat, crawling and eating, and late walking...

Infants who have had good developmental care leave the hospital sooner and with fewer complications. See! You really are important and we want to let you know how much all your hard work means to us and to the babies and their families. Nurse Heidi

P.S. Have you ever thought about this? Your little blankets and positional aids help us surround these babies literally in love. You are (with your work) closer to those babies than any human can be (many of these babies cannot be held yet and spend all day in the little isolette.) The only things touching them are your work and your efforts of love.

NATIONAL CONVENTION TO BE HELD IN LOUISVILLE, KY


