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Threads of Love Puts Smile on Tiny Faces in Honduras

*"The King will answer and say to them, 'Truly I say to you, to the extent that you did it to one of these brothers of Mine, even the least of them, you did it to Me.'" **Matthew 25:40***

Last March I was asked if Threads of Love would be willing to supply some blankets for an orphanage in Honduras. A team from Greenwell Springs Baptist Church had been down to Honduras and saw a need to build an orphanage; when they found 89 children of different ages living on the streets, some as young as 2 months, that were being taken care of by older siblings. Most of the children had been left as orphans due to their parents having died from AIDS. Having no one to take them in because most of the people in the village could hardly take care of their own children, some of the orphans roamed the street in the nude, sleeping where ever they could find a dry spot and digging through garbage for food. This group of men's hearts were so deeply touched that they immediately began putting together funds to build that so badly needed orphanage. Their plans were to return to Honduras in July with a sea chest full of needed supplies and clothing and to begin a home for these children.

The men have built 73 bunk beds and have gotten the local prison to make the mattress and pillows for the beds. A team member and his wife have supplied sheets and pillow

cases, now all they needed were blankets. I was asked if we could supply 73 blankets for the beds that they would be building, and of course my answer was "yes". One of the men came to the workshop on the day that we were making the blankets and shared with us what he had seen, how little these children had and how appreciative they were of the things that had been given to them on one of the medical mission trips. After hearing his testimony to what he had seen, we wanted to do more, we wound up making 177 blankets and then we decided that we would share our sewing talent with these children by making clothes for them. I send out an email to all of the chapters asking if other chapters wanted to help. The little pillow case dresses, boxer shorts and t-shirts began to arrive for the children. In all, we sent 538 dresses, 207 sets of boxer shorts and t-shirts, along with 188 pairs of underwear and 9 guardian angels. Another couple collected more boy clothes and many pairs of shoes for the children.

Several days after the team of men returned to the states a text message came in saying that they had opened the doors to the orphanage and had put to bed that night 139 children. For some of them this was the first time that they had ever slept in a bed, much less a safe, clean, and dry environment. How that must have warmed the hearts of those

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that had the opportunity to see those bright shining faces enjoy what it was like to have a safe place to sleep and a place to call home.

I asked one of the men on the mission team to tell his story about their trip to Honduras. The following is his story and what it meant to him.

“Greenwell Springs Baptist Church has a mission in Telamar, Honduras. The mission team has been in the process of making repairs to and paint the church in Tornabe and also build and orphanage for the precious ones with no families. Greenwell Springs Baptist Church, along with Threads of Love, put many smiles on these little faces. Close of six hundred (600) dresses and boys shorts and shirts where “handmade” by many chapters of Threads of Love throughout the U.S.

The FSBC mission is in Telamar, Honduras which is the home church for the interpreter we use when we are in Honduras. It is a small mission with approximately 70-80 members, with many small children.

Tornabe is a small village a few miles outside of Telamar where the residents are extremely poor and have very little. They have a church which GSBC is supporting. GSBC supplies one hot meal a day to 70 to 80 little boys and girls who have been orphaned.

As we began to give the clothes to the children and I could see numerous faces, one face was of a small child smiling, another with laughter and often time a tear or two.


I then could see the faces of ladies of Threads of Love who had made the garments. I knew that they had been sewed together with lots of love and most likely with smiles on their faces too. The ones who sewed those clothes together had done the very best they could do, every little detail

had to be just right in order to receive the little tag on the garment that reads “Threads of Love”.

It was a very touching moment for me as a member of the GSBC Construction Team. I couldn't help but shed a tear of two as I knew some of the ladies that had put their time and love into pleasing and serving the Lord and the little children of Honduras.

The GSBC Mission Team and numerous little ones will be forever grateful to Threads of Love for the generosity, love and overwhelming time spent on all that was offered these children. I know the Lord will richly bless each and every member of Threads of Love.”



A Tip For Sewing on Buttons



Always mark with a pin the place where the button is to go. Sew the button on over the pin, remove the pin, and wind the thread around the threads that hold the button to the cloth. This makes a firm little stem which raises the button just enough to make it set well in the buttonhole. It also prevents that nailed on look, as well as the homemade look of a spread-open buttonhole which is the result of a too tightly applied button.
