Threads of Love's Beloved Baby—Christine Noel Love

For the past seven years Threads of Love has held a memorial service called "Season of Hope." This service was held on Friday, December 6th in our little chapel at First Presbyterian Church here in Baton Rouge. My husband and I were on our way to church when the evening news came on reporting that the body of a newborn had been found the back a garbage truck that morning. I could not imagine how anyone could throw away a baby. We continued on the church and held the Season of Hope service remembering all the little babies that were not with us anymore, but were now in the arms of Jesus. The service is designed to reach out to those parents that have lost their little ones and to give them the hope and courage of continuing on without their babies. It turned out to be one of the best services that we have every had. It seems like each year the service is better than the year before.

However, I couldn't stop thinking about the abandoned baby. What an opportunity to show the love of Christ to a community and simply do right by this little one. Something had to be done so this little life could count for something. I decided to chose the name Christine Noel Love for her—Christine, for Christ, Noel, for the season; and Love, for Threads of Love. I couldn't stand the idea of her being known only as Baby Girl Jane Doe and being buried without any formality.

The following morning I was on the phone with the coroner's office. We are very blessed here in Baton Rouge that Dr. Louis Cataldie, our coroner, loves the Lord and wanted to give this baby a proper burial. He agreed that when the investigation was over he would release the little body to the care of Threads of Love for a Christian funeral. Once again the Lord had His hand in all of this...within two hours after talking with the coroner, all of the funeral arrangements had been donated for her burial by two of the local funeral homes here in Baton Rouge—Greenoaks Memorial Park and Welsh Funeral home.

The night before the funeral I went to the funeral home to take pictures, make hand and foot prints, and dress little Christine, just as Threads of Love has done for thousands of babies all over the country. I went with Debbie Fowler, who is a member of the Threads of Love Board of Directors, and a dear nurse at Woman's Hospital in labor and delivery. We made lots of remembrances of little Christine. As Debbie and I went about our work we questioned why and how a mother could do what Christine's mother had done. After Christine was dressed we each held her—for no other reason than for us to be able to say that someone had cuddled her and held her close. As I held her I thought about all the mothers who had attended the Season of Hope the week before and how their arms must ache to hold their little ones. And here I was, holding a baby that was thrown away like an unwanted piece of trash.

The investigation found that Christine was still alive when she was placed in a garbage bag and left in a pile of trash. The coroner said that the baby was most likely killed from a blow to the head that she received while in the garbage truck. What blows my mind is that Louisiana has what is known as a Safe Haven law. Mothers can take unwanted babies up to 30 days old and place them at a police, sheriff, fire station, or a hospital and walk away...no questions asked. How I wished Christine's mother had done this.

However our Lord can always take something ugly and turn it into something beautiful. As all of the arrangements were unfolding, I received a call from Elaine Courtney who teaches LPN classes at Delta College here in Baton Rouge. The nurses-in-training wanted to know how they could help with the burial for little Christine. We had everything for the funeral at that time so we decided that she would need a marker on her grave. With the help of donations to Threads of Love and the memorial fund at Delta College, we have collected enough donations to mark little Christine's grave. Delta College has set up a memorial fund which they will call Delta's Little Angel in memory of Christine Noel Love. All donations collected from the nurses throughout the year will go to support Threads of Love.

Even though Christine was here on earth for a very short time she has made a tremendous impact on the community. Her funeral had great media coverage by three TV stations and the local newspaper. The paper described the service as a 'heavily religious grave side service, attended by over 50 people.' There was a quote by Dr. Cataldie saying, "This allows for humanization of the child and increases awareness. People don't need to commit homicide if there is an unwanted child."

Little Christine was laid to rest dressed in a pink dress and a pink matching blanket that I made especially for her. She also had a pink smocked bonnet, booties and beautiful crocheted blanket made by some of the Threads of Love volunteers. She was surrounded by a pink lamb, a blue baby doll and a brown bear in her little white casket.

Garnett Slatton, one of the pastors at First Presbyterian, gave the eulogy, and he reminded us not to grieve for little Christine...that she was safe and happy in the loving arms of Jesus. At the end of the funeral, our dear music minister, Nancy Spiller, sang a lullaby to her. Every baby should have a lullaby sung to them; and Christine was no differ-

HELPFUL HINT

Always use natural fiber thread to sew heirloom projects. Don't use a thread such as polyester or polyester blend. You want a thread that has no memory and your garment will be free of puckers or gathers in the wrong places.

I sat down and cried when I read about your fabulous program helping preemie babies in an old copy of Family Circle, and wondered if your program was still in operation. I am the mother of two miracle preemies, and know that there were no clothes available for our babies when they were in the NICU because they were all way too big - even the new preemie clothes for sale in stores were too big and did not accommodate all of the wires and things connected to our babies. I know it would have really meant a lot to me to see our babies dressed up like the 'normal' babies everyone else had. Not having clothes for our babies, and thinking that they might die without ever being dressed was something that haunted me the entire time they were in the hospital. They were so tiny (only 1 pound 9 ounces at one time) and I wanted them to have everything that a 'normal' baby would have had. I also know for those parents who don't every get to see their baby come home, getting to see their baby dressed up so pretty and even to get a keepsake photo would be invaluable. My children's health has required me to stay at home with my babies since they were born, and I have always searched for a way to give something back to help other preemie parents but have never found something I could do while still providing for my own children - but this I CAN DO! I am an accomplished seamstress, and I can do this at home! Please send me any info you may have for a pattern - it would really mean more to me than you can imagine.

And sometimes I still am, but I also know that He won't give me more than I can handle, so he must think I am very strong to have given me this to live through. Through Him, all things are possible..... Please continue your special kind of ministry and know that you touched my life, not once, but twice.

If today you are feeling the heat of the fire, remember that God has His eye on you and will keep watching you until He

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
