Once again Threads of Love had a booth at the Martha Pullen Sewing Market in Arlington, Texas this year. As always it was an exciting time for me and a chance to meet lots of ladies who have the love of sewing and want to learn more about how they could serve the Lord with their talent of sewing. Attending this show always gives me a chance to meet some new ladies and ladies who are already a part of one of the Threads of Love chapters. For example, I had lunch with Kelly Butler from the Saginaw chapter and Juli Zoota, from the Fort Worth chapter, on Wednesday the day before the show started. The show also gives me a chance to meet and talk to families who have been touched by the ministry of Threads of Love. We are not looking for a thank you from families whose lives have been touched by our love of sewing; but it is always so encouraging to know that we are making a difference in what we are doing.

Just to show you that God has a sense of humor, I was asked to be in a fashion show on Friday night, as they needed someone my size. I had never done anything like that before, but Martha Pullen and her staff have been so great and supportive of Threads of Love over the years, I just couldn't say no. So Sissy was a model on Friday night!

I would like to share a story told to me by one of those families who received some of the lovely gifts of love donated by one of the chapters in Texas. She came by the booth just to say thank you and let us know that it had meant so much to her and her husband to receive these lovely gifts for their twins. She had delivered twin girls who were born too soon and had to stay in the NIC unit for some time. This Mother shared with me what the little clothes had meant to her and her husband, to be able to see their babies dressed in clothes that fit them and how much they appreciated them. What meant more than anything was the clothing that one of the twins was dressed in when she had to say good-bye to this little one, and how it had touched her heart to know that someone that she did not even know cared enough to spend time making this little dress for her baby.

I know some of you think that your chapter is small and feel like your chapter is not helping out that much, but it takes all of us to make a difference in the lives of these families. Threads of Love may not be making a big splash in the sea of hurt, but we are making a difference. We may be only a ripple in the water, but they know we are there and that we serve an awesome God. Just to let you know how much of a difference we are making as a group...... Threads of Love started placing labels on our garments in the fall of 1997, and as of today we have used over 460,000 labels. It's because of each one of you that we have been able to do this; so you see each one of you are real important, even if you only make a dozen items a year. When you add it all up it makes a big difference.....it takes every one of us sewing and donating these many items to show that they are made in honor of our Lord and to share His light into a dark time in the lives of families who are faced with the uncertain of their baby or in the loss of their precious little one. With thanks to people like Jean Grob, Cecilia Chaisson, and many other winter residents of the Sea Wind Campground at Loyola Beach, some of the physical needs for tiny infants are met through Threads of Love.

Threads of Love is a Christian outreach ministry with headquarters in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, that has chapters across the country. They provide handmade clothing, blankets, caskets, and other articles made by volunteers from donations for premature or sick babies that range from one to five pounds. Their ultimate, silent message is, "You are loved."

The founder of the sewing ministry was Clinel "Sissy" Davis, who had lost a brother born prematurely. Davis remembered the anguish and the **All you need is a lot of**

Davis remembered the anguish and the emptiness her family had faced. Years later, in the fall of 1993, Dr. Rachel Hausmann from the Earl K. Long Charity Hospital in Baton Rouge approached the pastor of her church with the need for tiny burial gowns for pediatric patients. With

pastor of her church with the need for tiny **Bellevue, Nebraska** burial gowns for pediatric patients. With the help of Anna Miller, chairperson of the Christian Community Action Committee of Presbyterian Women, they looked for other volunteers with sewing talents.

The first bolt of material was purchased with a \$100 donation from Katherine Dunham. The church bulletin requested additional help stating "all you need is a lot of love and thread...." Threads

of Love was born! After years of suffering as a surviving sibling, Davis had found a way to begin to heal and was doing something positive from a negative experience in her life.

Jean Grob is in her first year as chapter president; she took over the position from Norma Jean Caswell, from Medina, Texas, who began the organization here six years ago. They now have approximately 50 members at the campground who not only make the sewn items, but also build infant caskets; the men construct them and the ladies finish the inside. One-half of the items they craft annually are donated to Christus Spohn Memorial Hospital in Kingsville; the other half is taken to the hospital in Omaha, Nebraska, when the Grob's Let Your Light Shine! Because many of my friends know I'm involved in volunteer work, I received a phone call Sunday night of Memorial Day weekend ... "This is (the son of friends). My daughter is a senior at (a local high school) and needs 6 more community service hours by Tuesday to graduate. I was told you might be able to help." I suggested the teenager call me in the morning, and plan on coming over. Threads of Love lovie dolls was our project, and by the time she had to leave for a mid-afternoon job, her request was "This was fun; can I do some more?" She took eight more unfinished lovies home with her to sew on the hats and knot the hands! (Yes, she completed the hours she needed -- which was really only 4, but she did 51/2.) Cathleen

return home in March.

Grob commented, "I am so proud of the people here in the park. We made 421 different items in the past three months." She added that members of the organization continue to handcraft items year round and bring them back in December when they all meet again for another winter in South Texas.
